Neighborhood Arboretum in the Works

If you attended any of the community meetings for Knoxville's Urban Forest Master Plan, you learned that Fourth & Gill is on the lower end of tree canopy coverage, at roughly 16%. That means our canopy has plenty of room to grow (pun intended). In recent months, the City has helped out by planting eight new trees in the Fourth & Gill park area. Other areas of opportunity include vacant lots, back yards with no trees, and asphalt covered areas along Broadway.

Evan Tishuk and Gordon Coker (Knoxville Tree Board member), both Eleanor Street residents, are avid tree lovers. They don't even mind being called tree huggers. A couple of years ago, they identified trees in the neighborhood, and Tishuk developed a very cool app, https://fourthandgill.arboretum.site/?tree/, to identify trees in the neighborhood and create a tree walk. The app includes information like type and size of tree, sidewalk visibility, public property, and a link to Wikipedia for more details.

After taking a breather, the two are back at it, working on the next step. "Why don't we create an arboretum?", they asked themselves. There are only three arboretums in Knoxville: Lakeshore Park, Sequoia Hills and North Hills. After going through some hoops, like getting a permit from the City, they ordered identification plates and labels and began tagging trees. The final step is an official inspection and certification from the State of Tennessee via its Arboretum Program.





Why an arboretum? Tishuk and Coker want to increase awareness of the importance of having a vibrant urban canopy. Trees not only add beauty and shade to our neighborhood, they help counter urban pollution, reduce wastewater runoff, and create healthier air for all of us. Hopefully, added awareness will spur more neighbors to plant a tree in their yard or vacant lot (the right tree in the right place, of course!). With Fourth and Gill already such a wonderful pedestrian-friendly neighborhood, the arboretum is a good fit. This arboretum is comprised of public trees only. Its boundaries coincide with the tree walk outlined in blue on the tree map (see graphic

below). Hopefully, the arboretum will expand into other parts of the neighborhood and include private

So, grab the kids, a neighbor, or a friend and explore the tree walk. The route begins and ends at the Fourth and Gill Park. At the kiosk, you'll see a QR code posted that takes you to the site with information on all the tagged trees.

APRIL 11: Henley Baugh, an arborist from Consultrees Knoxville, will talk about the blight affecting our crepe myrtles and answer any tree or shrub questions we have.

MAY 9: Our neighbor, James Newburn, Managing Director of UT Gardens, will take us on a private tour of the gardens. We will meet at UT Gardens for this session. There is a nominal fee of \$6.00 per person, which helps fund the gardens. If you missed the tour two years ago, you'll want to go this year with the roses in bloom.

JUNE 13: Melynda Whetsel, national flower show judge, will give us a lesson on flower arranging. This is the perfect opportunity to learn from a pro. (Hint, hint—its great practice for the flower arrangement you'll be making in July for the flower show!)

SEPTEMBER 12: Guest speaker Rich Gettings of the Smoky Mountain Orchid Club will teach us all the basics about orchids.


OCTOBER 10: This date is our last meeting of the year and is available for a tour or speaker. Let Kimberly know if you have an idea for the meeting.

Springtime in the Fourth Avenue Meadow

You've probably noticed the whacky looking stretch of dead grass and perennials along Fourth Avenue across from Fourth and Gill Park. What may appear to be lifeless, and way past due for a mow, is brimming with new life! This area has been under restoration by Fourth and Gill's land stewardship group, the Woolly Bears, to establish a meadow comprised of plant species native to East Tennessee. This meadow provides much needed habitat for species that were once common throughout the ridge and valley of the Tennessee River, when grazing by large mammals and wildfire kept some habitats open and un-forested. By restoring the edges of our urban ecosystems to native meadow/prairie species, we can support not only these plants but also the insects, birds, and small mammals which depend on

The Woolly Bears has been collaborating with the City of

Knoxville on the restoration and maintenance of the Fourth Ave Meadow by selecting seed, removing invasive plants, and timing our mowing to benefit the critters utilizing the meadow. To that end, the group has scheduled the mowing of the meadow by early April to allow the insects which burrow into the dead stems of the plants time to develop and 'leave the nest.' Be on the lookout for the meadow expanding north and south towards Gill and Luttrell. The city has agreed to support the expansion of the meadow and the installation of an educational sign along the greenway discussing the importance of meadows. Celebrating Fundraising Success

In the third quarter of 2023, the Birdhouse Neighborhood Center held its first annual fundraiser and raised \$15,000 from 60 donors! Ninety-two percent of those donors were Fourth & Gill neighbors. The Birdhouse Neighborhood Center extends a HUGE thank you to everyone who contributed!

This fundraising campaign was crucial to achieving the Birdhouse's mission, goals, and objectives for the fiscal 2023-24 year.

Specifically, the contributions help subsidize low-cost rentals, fund the Birdhouse's one employee, and improve the historic building.

Some examples of recent renters that benefited from these

contributions are: Socially Equal Energy Efficient Development (SEEED), SpaceCraft (founded by our Fourth & Gill neighbor Jaleria Rivera), a 12-Step Recovery Group for women, yoga and meditation classes, A1LabArts, a Greene County youth group learning about hip-hop music, a mom and baby meetup group, and many bands and local musical talent.

In the upcoming months, the Birdhouse will be developing partnerships with Knox Pride and The Bottom; creating a Social Justice Task Force to increase social justice programming at the Birdhouse; holding a community summer party in June; continuing to hold First Fridays featuring local artists; increasing our volunteer base; and building more programming for adults 26-45 years old.
